5.	<b>Summary:</b> Allows a prescriber to prescribe naloxone to a patient for administration to a person other than the patient when the patient believes the person is experiencing or is about to experience a life-threatening opiate overdose and allows a person to possess naloxone and administer naloxone to a person experiencing or about to experience a life-threatening opiate overdose. The bill also allows emergency medical services personnel and other first responders to possess and administer naloxone pursuant to a standing order or oral or written protocol.
