**2. Patron:** O'Bannon

**3. Committee:** Health, Welfare and Institutions.

**4. Title:** Naloxone; administration in cases of opiate overdose.

**5. Summary:** Allows a prescriber to prescribe naloxone to a patient for administration to a person other than the patient when the patient believes the person is experiencing or is about to experience a life-threatening opiate overdose and allows a person to possess naloxone and administer naloxone to a person experiencing or about to experience a life-threatening opiate overdose. The bill also allows emergency medical services personnel and other first responders to possess and administer naloxone pursuant to a standing order or oral or written protocol.

**7. Fiscal Impact Estimates:** Final.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** This legislation has no fiscal impact. The Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services currently operates a pilot program related to the administration of Naloxone. This legislation would not increase the responsibilities of the department.
