4. Title: Special conservators of the peace

5. Summary:

Current law authorizes a circuit court judge to appoint a special conservator of the peace for a term of up to four years. Generally, special conservators of the peace have general police powers within the geographical limits set out in the court order.

The proposed legislation would authorize the court to retain jurisdiction over the appointment order after the appointment was made. It also would authorize a judge to revoke a special conservator of the peace appointment order for good cause shown, upon the filing of a sworn petition by the attorney for the Commonwealth, sheriff, or chief of police for the relevant jurisdiction or by the Department of Criminal Justice Services. In addition, the legislation provides that a special conservator of the peace's appointment would be subject to suspension or revocation if he or she were convicted of any of various misdemeanors or any felony.
