- **4. Title:** Government Data Collection and Dissemination Practices Act; limitations on us of information.
- **5. Summary:** The proposal limits the ability of law-enforcement and regulatory agencies to use any surveillance technology, including license plate readers, to collect and maintain personal information on individuals and organizations where a warrant has not been issued and there is no reasonable suspicion of criminal activity by the individual or organization.

Information collected by a license plate reader without a warrant shall only be retained for seven days and shall only be used for the investigation of a crime or a report of a missing person. After seven days such collected information must be purged unless it is being utilized in an ongoing investigation .

- 7. Fiscal Impact Estimates: Final. See Item 8.
- 8. Fiscal Implications: The legislation would require a criminal or administrative warrant before law enforcement or regulatory agencies can use surveillance technology to collect or maintain personal information when the data collected is not intended for prompt evaluation and potential use for suspected criminal activity or terrorism by an individual or organization. However, law enforcement agencies can collect information form license plate readers and the information can be retained only for seven days unless it is being utilized in an ongoing investigation. The legislation has no known fiscal impact on state agencies.
- **9.** Specific Agency or Political Subdivisions Affected: Department of State Police and local law enforcement agencies.
- 10. Technical Amendment Necessary: None.
